By all accounts, 2019 has been our best year yet and that's saying something for an organization with a 118-year history. We have, and continue, to make a difference in the Jewish world and we are uniquely situated to realize our strategic vision of building and connecting young and old alike to our ancestral soil. Your investment as a partner with Jewish National Fund is critical to our achievement.



We must inspire and engage the next generation to continue the legacy of our people; we connect thousands of our young people from the United States to the land and people of Israel better than anyone through our platform, **"from birth to the boardroom**." When I meet our teenagers and our **JNFuture** members (22 to 40-year-olds), the fastest growing segment of our donor base, their enthusiasm and passion for Israel is clear. Thousands of college students are going on Birthright Israel every year on Shorashim and many are returning to Israel on our Alternative Break programs and continue to

attend Positively Israel programs on their campuses. Their connection to Israel is stronger than ever.

Our Alexander Muss High School in Israel semester abroad program is growing every year. As a matter of fact, we are growing so fast that we have almost outgrown our existing campus. I can't believe that five years ago, we dreamed about increasing our student enrollment to 1,500 students per year, and now that dream is becoming a reality. These are teenagers experiencing an academic semester abroad while learning 4,000 years of Jewish history right where it happened. They are being accepted into the best universities, and we are engaging and mentoring them—they will become the leaders on the boards of Jewish organizations in the years ahead. That is due to the commitment you are making today to help us plan for our future.

In Israel, the work that comprises our signature *One Billion Dollar Roadmap for the Next Decade*, which is now at \$645 million, is well underway:

- We continue to deliver fire trucks to help bring security and safety to communities throughout Israel.
- A 28-acre lake in Be'er Sheva is now filled with recycled water-the largest manmade lake in Israel, and the centerpiece of our 7-mile **River Park Project**.

• Over 401 young men and women are serving in the **Israel Defense Forces (IDF)** today in a program called **Special in Uniform**. The IDF is the only military in the world that incorporates people with special needs as equals in uniform.

• We are transforming the Galilee, bringing 300,000 people to live there by giving them a place to call home.

• We are building beautiful parks, planting millions of trees, and undertaking water resource development–all made possible by you.

We set our strategic sites on bringing 500,000 people to the Negev, and we are doing it meticulously, strategically, thoughtfully, and creatively, together with our affiliates in Israel and you, our partners in the U.S.

Now we have a lot to do: Develop the **JNF-USA Israel Education & Technology Campus** in Be'er Sheva, change the narrative in the Galilee to increase the population in Northern Israel, bring jobs to the Negev, rebuild historical sites, develop water resources, and bring dignity and assistance to people with special needs.

We are doing that and more.

We are building a legacy, not just for us today, but for our children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and the children yet unborn.

Today, our voice is stronger than ever, our story more powerful. Let's continue this journey together.

WOMEN FOR ISRAEL

Women are a powerful force in philanthropy and that power shapes our world.

THE WOMEN OF JEWISH NATIONAL FUND ARE UNSTOPPABLE

JNF's Women for Israel (WFI) raised \$21.1 million in 2019! We now have:

- <u>460 members of the **Chai Society**</u> (\$1,800+ annual gift).
- <u>Nearly 800</u> Sapphire Society members (\$5,000+ annually), JNF's Major Donor society for women.

• <u>157 Circle of Sapphire Society</u> members (\$100k or more annually); 59 are Circle of Sapphire Plus at \$200k or more.

• 2,342 women attended events to hear from high-powered speakers. Our **Women's Month** in May included a \$1 million match that proved to be a forceful incentive for women to increase their donations. We raised \$4.2 million, excluding the matching gift (up from \$2.2 million last year) and held over 25 events around the country.

Ten WFI Board retreats were held across the country to support and provide guidance locally as well as help with planning for the coming year to better achieve goals at every giving level.

The WFI National Executive Board met in August for the first time for a twoday leadership retreat at **The Ronald S. Lauder JNF House** to strategize for the upcoming 3-10 years. ♥ 60% of wealth today is controlled by women.

MAJOR DONORS

LEADING THE WAY

Jewish National Fund's Major Donor division—we refer to them as our partners—was the driving force behind our campaign's success with record numbers in dollars and donorsreaching over \$72.5 million with 2,191 new major gifts (72 more gifts totaling \$3 million+ more than last year). Our Major Donor Thank You Weekend in Las Vegas boasted 140 attendees, and the **President's Society Missions** attracted new donors from around the country. We also saw increased campaigns in every division from \$10,000 and up, including our \$1 million **World Chairman's Council** membership, which grew by 12, now with 173 members. ♥

COMMUNITY BUILDING

MORE THAN HOUSES

We're not building houses. We're transforming regions into places to call home.

In Be'er Sheva, the capital of the Negev, the 28-acre lake was filled with recycled water! Watch for restaurants and boating, soon! Jewish National Fund's Lauder Employment Center, has served over 3,500 beneficiaries to date with 1,000 new jobs created in collaboration with 300 employers, and a retention rate of 85% of internship graduates in the Negev, thanks to securing jobs following the program. JNF's NetGev Hi-Tech Hubs (a partnership with CISCO Israel) in Hura and Dimona provided hundreds of residents with ongoing training and technical courses, professional development, and use of remote work space. More than 1,200 have attended workshops and participants have seen a 35% increase in income thanks to mentoring, networking, and co-working office space. NetGev Dimona hosted Amazon Web Services

for a full day of competitive training seminars, attracting over 50 young developers from around the Negev. In addition, the Lauder Employment Center received 120 applications for 20 internship spots offered to engineering students from various Negev colleges at top Negev companies including SodaStream and Osem Foods.

HALUTZA

Population is now at 2,400 people in the communities of Halutza, located adjacent to the Gaza and Egyptian borders. There have been over 20,000 medical visits from residents to the Helmsley Charitable Trust Halutza Medical Center, which operates a dental clinic, pharmacy, and physical therapy clinic. In addition, community access to emergency services was enhanced thanks to a lead gift from Ruth and Bernie Mintz and the provision of a new firefighting vehicle. In addition, a volunteer firefighting course was established that already has 45 new recruits from the local community.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

• 48 new homes were constructed,

10,000 visits to JNF's Sderot Indoor Recreation Center.



60 families moved in, and 80 jobs were added in farming, healthcare, education, and construction.

Scores of children enjoy the area's Grossman Daycare Center, and the Charlene Vener Women's Initiative empowers women with a variety of programming.

• The newly launched Halutza

Student Program will offer graduating Ben Gurion University students the opportunity to relocate to and live in Halutza.

• The new **Shlomit Central Park** is currently under construction thanks to the efforts of **Charles Gallo** and a lead gift from **Blossom and Gunther Sprecher**, *z"l*. The five-acre park will be accessible to all, giving children in Halutza the opportunity to play in a wide communal area.

Construction on a new half-size



Olympic pool will commence in 2020. • The community was blessed to receive a Sefer Torah donated by **Ike Blachor**.

In the Gaza Envelope we broke ground on the new Eshkol Playschool Kingdom, a state-of-the-art educational campus that will provide a safe place for 3,000 kids to learn and play, just a few miles away from the Gaza border. The facility will incorporate three elementary schools. We finished the new protected wing of the Eshkol Resilience Center, which services all the residents from the area. And, straight from the top of Masada where our Be Inscribed program is happening, we danced in a Torah and dedicated it to Kibbutz Kerem Shalom, which is one of the fastest growing kibbutzim in the region.

CENTRAL ARAVA

• The Richard and Nancy Simches Arava Emergency Response Center is complete, enabling safer



recreation and peace of mind to
residents and visitors in the area.
One hundred housing lots have
been established in Idan, Ein Yahav,
Hatzeva, and Zuquim. There are
350 lots under various stages of
construction (mainly infrastructure).

• Construction of the **Toby & Mort Mower Community Center** in Zuquim was completed.

The new kindergartens in Sapir and Hatzeva are both operational.
The construction of the Arava Aquatic Sports Center is underway and made possible through a gift from EGL Charitable Foundation. The facility is expected to be completed by Passover 2020.

JNF affiliate **MAKOM**, a network of communities focused on empowering and revitalizing towns and villages in the Negev and Galilee while bringing new families and individuals to populate these areas, now has 207 unique communities across the entire country, with 18,700 members and impacting over 580,000 people!

• In Sderot, five **MAKOM** communities made of 300 members directly impact the lives of 20,000 people.

• The Modern Orthodox **MAKOM** community in Mitzpe Ramon has grown to 320 members, including a post army *midrasha*, and a family

center that provides support to foster the growth of young families in the region.

• In the Ethiopian communities of the Northern Negev, the Hineni Ethiopian

Israel's national baseball team was one of only six teams to qualify for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Urban Agricultural centers bridge the gap between the older and younger generations of Ethiopian Jews, by teaching traditional agricultural practices to younger generations, and to visitors from all over Israel.

PROJECT BASEBALL

Jewish National Fund's Project Baseball and the Israel Association of Baseball continue to rise in popularity with activities taking place in Zichron Yaacov, Be'er Sheva, and Tel Aviv. Today, some 1,000 kids and adults play baseball in centers around Israel from Be'er Sheva in the south to Misgav in the north. A new field is being built in Beit Shemesh and field development in Ra'anana continues to move ahead. Notably, Israel's national baseball team was one of only six teams to qualify for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

ALIYAH IS ON THE RISE! 62,000 OLIM AND COUNTING!

 This past summer, JNF affiliate
 Nefesh B'Nefesh helped 2,282 people make *aliyah* (immigration to Israel), including 293 families, 894 singles,
 679 children, 241 pioneers to Israel's frontier communities, 117 medical professionals, and 196 soon to be lone soldiers. Their 60th signature charter flight–sponsored and named by Heidi Rothberg–brought 242 new *olim* (new immigrants), and 3 sets of twins! The goal is 4,000 olim by the end of 2019.
 OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

The Nefesh Tel Aviv HUB, the only co-working space designated for olim, helps individuals professionally and hosts social events weekly, including monthly Shabbat dinners with over 100 olim in attendance!
The Nefesh Campus Initiative engages college students in a *Positively*

Israel conversation, educating them about professional and social opportunities that Israel offers in a thriving ecosystem. 64 campuses have



been visited to date.

• The new one-of-a-kind **ORI Women in Service program** supports more than 300 young women who come to Israel entirely alone to strengthen and care for Israel's weakest sectors through their national service.

And coming up: a magnificent new campus on Israel's National Mall,



Planning for **The Galilee Culinary Institute (GCI) by JNF** on the **Marvin Sukonik Campus** is well underway. The initiative directed by Chef Lior Lev Sercarz will contribute to the creation of 40,000 direct and indirect jobs in the Greater Kiryat Shmona region. In 2019, JNF announced the appointment of Netflix celebrity chef, Michael Solomonov, as the inaugural JNF Culinary Advisory Council member. Because today's chefs and food innovators need to know more than just how to cook, GCI by JNF will train new chefs and utilize Tel Hai College for business acumen, food security, and technology studies.

located directly across from the Supreme Court building, the new Foreign Ministry, the Knesset, and next door to the planned new Prime Minister's residence–placing aliyah at the forefront of the national agenda with thanks to the generosity of our committed Denver donors.

GO NORTH

As part of the Go North Campaign, the Western Galilee is a focal point of JNF's work in developing the north, with nearly 40% of its local economy connected to the tourism industry. The JNF Western Galilee Tourist Information Center, located in Akko and managed by JNF affiliate Western Galilee Now (WGN) has become the gateway to the hidden beauty of the Western Galilee, with 30,000 visitors in 2019. The Gallery at the Tourist Information Center has hosted three different local artist exhibitions, each demonstrating a different aspect of the rich cultural diversity of the region, while sharing the stories of the local artists who are part of WGN.

WGN now boasts 52 diverse member businesses, collectively providing 650 jobs to local residents and expanding the growing tourism industry. The winter and spring festivals have attracted over 4,000 people from around the country to experience the magic and beauty of the Western Galilee, shown through the collective experiences of WGN's members. Additionally, WGN has hosted the first annual July Art Festival, showcasing the local artisans throughout the summer months, and the Annual Western Galilee Now Wine Festival, bringing together WGN's top winemakers to share their award-winning wines with hundreds of attendees.

WGN has also represented the region at major tourism trade shows, bringing over 100 top tourism agencies for day trips each month. In 2019, WGN has begun a six-month tourism training program in conjunction with the Ma'ale Yosef Regional Council. This program, supported by the local ministries, will help create more tourism opportunities and attract businesses to the region.

The new WGN and JNF Tourist Information Center websites, in both English and Hebrew, gives visibility to the local members and provides automated guides to bring thousands of visitors to the Western Galilee, greatly contributing to its economic development.

The Food Innovation Center on the Greenbaum Family Campus in the Upper Eastern Galilee will serve as a research incubator, small business hub, and open work space for the food and agricultural technology industries. The center will help realize the dynamic vision of Israel to lead the global food tech industry, with opportunities for agricultural research and development programs, high tech food companies, and the hospitality industry to come together under one roof to create a power center of knowledge.

HOUSING DEVELOPMENT FUND

In 2019, Jewish National Fund's Housing Development Fund supported:

- 26 communities.
- 1,190 housing lots (20% increase over 2018 figures).
- More than \$18 million approved to support the 26 communities.

• First repayments received in 2019 for nearly \$500,000, which can be reinvested in new community expansion projects. ♥

ISRAEL ADVOCACY AND EDUCATION

FROM BIRTH TO THE BOARDROOM

JNF is the single largest provider of Israel engagement programs in the United States.

Jewish National Fund is at the forefront of making Israel advocacy and education an integral part of the educational process, ensuring that the next generation will develop a deep individual connection and understanding of Israel today. From preschool through college, and beyond, JNF's Israel Continuum has become a leading authority on Israel education for each stage of Jewish learning. Jewish National

Fund spreads the message of **Positively Israel**, empowering a network of educators from schools, synagogues, youth organizations, and campuses across the country to amplify the power of

JNF's educational programming. JNF has quickly become a natural and essential part of any educational curriculum.

The just launched JNF High

provides numerous opportunities for high school students to discover their own personal connection to Israel and Jewish National Fund, by focusing on key fellowship, educational, and volunteer opportunities during these

critical years of personal development. OTHER KEY PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS BY THE NUMBERS:

 1,200 students completed JNF's premier high school educational program at the Alexander Muss High School in Israel-JNF (AMHSI-JNF).

JEWISH NATIONAL FUND-USA ISRAEL EDUCATION AND TECHNOLOGY CAMPUS

A groundbreaking was held in February on what will be the single largest project in the history of JNF-USA-the Jewish National Fund-USA Israel **Education & Technology** Campus. This \$300 million campus will serve as a second home for the Alexander Muss High School catering to 500 students; an adult Zionist education and conference center providing a space for up to 100 conference attendees; and a campus for young adults in Israel for technology internships, with the aim of providing 20 internships per year. This eco-system-the only one of its kind in the world-will enable global Jewry of all ages to convene at once or at different times on a single campus with programming, shared spaces, accommodations, and harness the power of Positively Israel/ Jewish conversation. The campus will be situated on 16 acres of land within the Be'er Sheva River Park and will change the face of the global Jewish conversation. A feasibility study was just completed by KPMG and fundraising is now underway.

and American academics, exposing these leading educators to the cultural mosaic of Israeli society. • 80 non-Jewish collegiate student leaders participated on the **Caravan for Democracy Student Leadership Mission**, sharing JNF's *Positively Israel* message among American campus leaders. • 160 Jewish students volunteered on their vacations to participate on JNF's **Alternative Break** programs.

JNF affiliate Green Horizons

(Tomorrow's Leaders), focuses on educating Israeli youth using hiking and walking the land of Israel as their main educating tool. They had 8,000 overnight hikes this year with participants walking over 112,000 miles of Israel, and expanded to three new communities, adding over 300 participants.

HaShomer HaChadash-a JNF affiliate that physically connects young people to the land of Israel and Zionism by working on ranches, farms, and frontier watch posts across Israelengaged over 80,000 young volunteers in 2018 in various programs on some 250,000 acres of land, including 10,000 youth from abroad over the past five years. In cooperation with JNF, HaShomer recently opened Adam V'Adama Leaders of the Land High School at Hatzeva to teach state-ofthe-art environmental science and agricultural security. The school held its second graduation ceremony in 2019. An additional campus is currently being constructed and it will open in 2020.

JNF BORUCHIN CENTER

The revolutionary force in connecting America to Israel, the JNF **Boruchin Center** was created in 2015 following a \$250 million estate gift of the late **John and Dora Boruchin**, *z"l* of California. It strengthens the lifelong connection of all Americans, and in particular young Jewish Americans, to the land and people of Israel through innovative and inspiring programming.

During 2019, the JNF Boruchin Center made grants totaling \$1,908,100 to the

THE ISRAEL ON CAMPUS COALITION (ICC) The ICC aims to unite the many pro-Israel organizations that operate

on campuses across the U.S. by coordinating strategies, providing educational resources, sharing in-depth research, and increasing collaboration.

HEROES TO HEROES

Heroes to Heroes teams up combat veterans of all conflicts and all faiths who have attempted suicide or are on a path to self-destruction for a life-changing journey to Israel. The program provides healing and peer-topeer support through the development of social and emotional connections formed while physically and spiritually challenging themselves.

FACULTY FELLOWSHIPS

Faculty Fellowship Summer Institute in Israel sponsors full-time U.S.-based university and college faculty members on a 10-day program in Israel. The program matches participants with Israeli counterparts in their fields of study to facilitate academic collaboration, while also exposing them to an Israel that transcends the current conflict.

AMHSI-JNF SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The **AMHSI-JNF Scholarship Fund** enables students with demonstrated financial need to attend a session at Alexander Muss High School in Israel.

CARAVAN FOR DEMOCRACY

The **Caravan for Democracy Student Leadership Mission** is a 10-day, fully subsidized educational program to Israel for non-Jewish student leaders who have never been there.

AMHSI-JNF IMPACT FUND

AMHSI-JNF Impact Funds provide merit based fellowships for study at AMHSI-JNF to dynamic and dedicated high school students who demonstrate academic achievement, leadership qualities, and potential to be future Jewish community leaders. ♥

WATER

SOLUTIONS FOR A WATER-STARVED WORLD

Groundbreaking initiatives launched this year.

Jewish National

Fund has increased Israel's water economy by over 15% through the treatment, recycling, and collection of waste and runoff water, responsible aquifer drilling, and river rehabilitation, in addition to supporting imperative research and development.



In support of farmers in the Negev, JNF has built a new reservoir in Ramat HaNegev to store recycled water for agricultural use to help reduce costs for water and increase crop yields.

Breakthrough advances in research

have been made at the Arava's Whole Orchard Lysimeter, the world's largest facility for the study of water and fertilizer needs of date palms. This data helps save money and water, while achieving a 25%+ increase in crop yields.

Once finished the **Arava Wastewater**

Treatment Plant will treat 500,000cubic meters of sewage water from six regional kibbutzim and farms, which will be piped into the existing JNF-built **Elifaz Reservoir** for agricultural use. In the Bedouin community of **Wadi Aricha,** on-site, self-sustaining, and solar powered wastewater disposal systems have been installed in individual households, with recycled water now being used to irrigate local olive groves. This also helps protect and prevent the contamination of the nearby Hebron and Be'er Sheva Rivers.

Eight new **Rainwater Harvesting Projects** were installed in 2019, bringing the total to 70 schools participating across Israel and empowering over 90,000 students. This program is a practical way to save water and provides a hands-on, interactive means of educating students about conservation and encouraging scientific curiosity. We continue to support the Stockholm Water Prize competition, which encourages young people to invent new water solutions to counter global challenges. ♥

FORESTRY & GREEN INNOVATIONS

THE POWER OF SOIL

As the original "Tree People," we understand the value of green.

Jewish National Fund is a pioneer in afforestation and fire prevention and an innovator in ecological development. JNF has helped make Israel an environmental powerhouse, planting more than 260 million trees throughout Israel that span more than 250,000 acres. Additionally, over 50,000 visitors from across the globe, including visiting heads of state, took part in the timehonored tradition of planting trees at **JNF's Harvey Hertz Ceremonial Tree Planting Center at the Neot Kedumim Biblical Preserve**. JNF also



helped battle nearly 1,000 forest fires, helped forests regenerate, and provided support for **Israel's Fire & Rescue**

> service with 14 new firetrucks, lifesaving equipment, and the building of two new fire stations in Ma'alot and Yerucham. ♥

DISABILITIES & SPECIAL NEEDS

INCLUSION & INTEGRATION

Israel has over 1 million people who have some form of disability that makes them struggle with life's daily activities.



Jewish National Fund has devoted close to \$50 million towards our work for people with disabilities in Israel, with \$6.5 million in 2019 and provided services to more than 50,000 children, youth, and adults with special needs. Nearly 13% of Israel's citizens are considered physically or mentally challenged, and JNF is dedicated to ensuring that no one is left behind.

Special in Uniform expanded to include 30 Israel Defense Forces (IDF) bases with 420 soldiers with special needs volunteering and serving; 85 of the participants received their official IDF ID cards. We also launched the **Rita & Burt Tansky IDF Hearing-Impaired Program**, opened the first Druze unit in Northern Israel, and initiated a post-army employment program to help integrate Special in Uniform soldiers into civilian life.

LOTEM-Making Israel Accessible saw an 18% increase in participation from last year in Israel's special education schools, providing more than 43,000 children access to outdoor activities. Across the country, 51,000 children participated in nature clubs and Emek HaShalom welcomed 14,000 visitors–a 42% increase from 2018.

Jewish National Fund's **ALEH Negev-Nahalat Eran**, a rehabilitative village in the Negev, has 143 residents and provides 10,000 outpatient rehabilitative treatments. It welcomed over 450 volunteers to the village and expanded the staff to 425 employees.

This year, work began on the \$60 million **NeuroOrthopedic Rehabilitation Hospital**. The Neuro-Science Rehabilitation Research Pilot Program began operation in collaboration with Ben Gurion University and Dr. John W. Krakauer, director of the BLAM Lab at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine.

Red Mountain Therapeutic Riding Center at Kibbutz Grofit provided over 12,000 therapy sessions to 240 riders in 2019, with 170 participating through JNF's scholarship program. The riding programs have been integrated into 15 educational programs for people with special needs in the south.



RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

JNF IS: CUTTING EDGE

Jewish National Fund is a leader in researching and developing cuttingedge technology that puts it at the forefront of meeting and exceeding global challenges.

As experts search for ways to help our ever-changing planet, the world is watching Israel and what it is doing in the desert. For more than a century, JNF has sponsored many research initiatives, solidifying itself as a world leader in

technological, agricultural, and environmental innovations.

At JNF's Central Arava R&D Center. biologists continue to focus on finding cures for cancers, Alzheimer's, and ALS. In the Negev Desert,

JNF supported innovative solutions in the areas of solar power, water sustainability, agricultural development, and renewable energy. JNF's partnership with the

Arava International Center for **Agricultural Training (AICAT)**

helps impart professional agricultural knowledge and skills to students from developing countries while establishing new JNF Claire and Marc Perlman Campus is now complete, increasing AICAT's capacity to 2,500 students a year and offering students access to new state-of-the-art classrooms. In 2019, 106 students and interns

> from 13 countries participated in the academic program of JNF affiliate Arava Institute for Environmental Studies. The Jisr az-Zarqa Society Project brought a group of recent Arava Institute alumni to a Northern

Israeli town to learn Arabic and enjoy a first-hand experience of life in a Bedouin town. This initiative immersed the participants in a meaningful mutual exchange through an intensive Arabic course, volunteering, and participation in community events.

Through developing applied research capacity and exchanging relevant knowledge and experience between two arid regions of the world (the American southwest and the Israeli south), the JNF Joint Institute will have a positive impact on vulnerable communities, especially in arid lands, and will make the world a better place.

Dive into the past and the fight for Israel's independence.

Jewish National Fund is committed to caring for and preserving Israel's historical sites—in particular, those that surround Israel's Independence Experience—and ensuring each site and its story is properly documented and preserved.

With an all-time high of 3.2 million visitors to heritage sites across Israel, Jewish National Fund and the Society for Preservation of Israel Heritage Sites (SPIHS) continued to work together toward making these sites accessible to people with physical or cognitive disabilities. In 2019, the Ayalon Institute broke ground on the construction of a new lobby to accommodate the increasing number of visitors. To increase accessibility, construction of an elevator and a wider staircase leading down into the Institute's underground bullet factory continues, and phase one is scheduled to be completed by June 2020.

At the **Atlit Immigration Detention Camp**, work continues on the state-of-the-art **C46 Airplane Experience Project**, funded by **Jack**



Grynberg, where visitors will learn about the perilous journey 150 Jews made to Israel from Iraq and Italy, known as "Operation Michaelberg." The exhibit will also feature a film and an accessible wheelchair ramp into the plane. Completion date is expected by early 2020.

At the **Atlit Information Center**, more than 1,000 names were added to the database of clandestine immigrants, bringing it to 125,155 recorded names. As the community of Atlit immigrants grow older, video testimonials are being recorded to preserve the memory of Israel's Independence Experience for future generations. In 2019, over 70 new video testimonies were added, bringing the total to 1,051 testimonials.

In **Gush Etzion**, construction is nearing completion on the **Gush Etzion Museum & Heritage Center**, which, once completed, will contain a hall retelling the miracle of Gush Etzion today. Renovations include a new gift shop with products from the area, a cafeteria, and a learning area.

We're heard by tens of thousands on our podcast, IsraelCast, including in 40+ countries, some of which have no diplomatic relations with Israel. Our podcast has grown 100% in listeners year over year. Our YouTube channel has been watched for over half a million minutes, and has achieved a 20% increase in subscribers. 200K people joined us on social media, with 50K watching live during our National Conference. We averaged 65K users through Facebook each week. We increased our Instagram following by over 75%. The use of Instagram stories and Facebook live at events around the country and on the ground in Israel rose.
